#### SAHRC expects draft action plan from H&M on diversity, racism

The commission says it's deeply disappointed by a recent advertisement by the global retailer.

The South African Human Rights Commission (SAHRC) says it expects to receive a draft plan of action from retailer H&M on how to deal with diversity and racism.

The commission says it's deeply disappointed by a recent advertisement by the global retailer, which featured a black boy in a hoodie with the words "Coolest Monkey in the Jungle".

The ad sparked public outcry, forcing the retailer to remove it and to issue an apology. The organisation says it met with representatives from the retailer on Friday.

SAHRC CEO Tseliso Thipanyane says: "I've heard issues of unfair discrimination and racism with or without complaints. Upon seeing the hoodie and seeing the reaction by South Africans, the commission felt that it was racist and offensive."

H&M has since announced it will embark on anti-racism programmes both locally and around the world.

H&M says it's usually high standards of checks and balances have failed the company. (Source: EWN) Read more

## Shocking allegations against surgery that "separates patients by race"

A medical surgery in Mokopane, Limpopo, has come under fire from the South African Human Rights Commission (SAHRC) for alleged racism breaching a number of medical ethics codes....

SAHRC provincial manager Victor Mavhidula told News24 that the commission had visited the surgery and found that patients were segregated upon entry, and treated differently based on race.

Mavhidula said he walked into the surgery, closely followed by a white female colleague, and both were attended to by different people.

He said when he arrived, he was attended to by a receptionist on the left – a black woman, while his white colleague who walked in seconds later was attended to by a white woman on the right. "When I asked about this, I was told that it was because the woman had an appointment with the doctor," he said, adding that the staff was unaware that they had come together to test the veracity of the allegations. Both had not made appointments. (Source: News24) Read more

### Call to speed up eradication of bucket toilets

FOLLOWING a report released by the Human Right Commission late last year that indicated that Free State province has the highest number of bucket toilets remaining in the country, local residents have now urged the provincial government to speed the process to eradicate the bucket system.

This had now become a serious health hazard especially due to the heatwave. The South African Humans Rights Commission (SAHRC) revealed through their report released in September last year that a large percentage of households in the province had no sanitation facilities.


The commission said although the bucket system had declined rapidly in the last couple of months the backlog was still high. The report showed that the number of buckets had significantly dropped from 17.2% in 2002 to 5.5% in 2017. (Source: The New Age) Read more

### SAHRC releases report on trends in human rights violations in South Africa

The South African Human Rights Commission today, 9 January 2018, released its Annual Trends Analysis Report (ATAR) outlining statistics and data on human rights violations received by the Commission during 2015-2016. Compiled from cases received from all 9 of the Commission's provincial offices, the report highlights that inequality remains one of the single biggest obstacles to the attainment of human rights, as envisaged by the Constitution.

The top five most violated human rights in South Africa are:

- Equality (749 complaints)
- Unfair labour practices (440 complaints
- Ongoing lack of access to health care, water, food, and social security (428 complaints)
- Violations of the right to just administrative action (379 complain
- Violations of rights in relations to arrest and detention (409 complaints). <u>Read more</u>
